The Atlantic City Free Public Library will pay tribute to the impact of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and Black History Month at upcoming programs in January and February.

First, poets of all ages and abilities are invited to the Tribute to Dr. King Poetry

Workshop at 6 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 16. Writer and radio host Raymond Tyler will lead the program.

Attendees will embrace their inner poet — and the spirit of Dr. King — by writing about their hopes, dreams, wishes and wants.

On Saturday, Jan. 19, at

2 p.m., everybody is invited to a special program — Celebrating Dr. King's Legacy. The guest speaker will be long-time Atlantic City resident and community activist Kaleem Shabazz.

Shabazz will discuss the relevance of Dr. King's philosophy in the age of Presi-

dent Barack Obama. This program is for all ages as everybody can learn how Dr. King's influence has not only paved the way for President Obama, but led him to refer to Dr. King as one of his greatest influences.

Shabazz is a board mem-

ber of the American Conference on Diversity and former commissioner of the New Jersey Martin Luther King, Jr., Commemorative Commission. He was South Jersey Director of the National Conference of Christians

The Greater Philadelphia Asian Culture Center will join in the festivities, which will include traditional music and dance, calligraphy, paper folding and paper cutting.

The music and dance performance, along with the calligraphy, are scheduled to begin at 1 p.m. No registration is required.

As part of the library's weekly Fun Day Sunday schedule, a paper cutting

program will be held 2 p.m. in the Main Library's second-floor meeting room. Space is limited, and registration is required. Sign up by visiting the Main Library's Youth Services Department (second floor) or calling (609) 345-2269, ext. 3050.

Participants in this program will learn about Chinese paper cutting traditions and will create their own dimensional snakes.

Chinese New Year is regarded as the most important and longest holiday (15 days) in China. Chinese New Year starts on the first day of the lunar calendar, so it is also called Lunar New Year.

Author from projects to share impact of writing on his life


Youth ages 11 to 17 are invited to the Atlantic City Free Public Library's Meet the Author program — featuring urban fiction writer Torrey Maldonado — at 2 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 23.

He wrote *Secret Saturdays*, which was selected in 2011 as an American Library Association Quick Pick for Reluctant Young Adult Readers. His book has also been featured on ABC, NBC, and CNN.

Youth who want to discuss the book before Maldonado's arrival can do so at 1 p.m. that day.

Maldonado grew up in the Red Hook projects in Brooklyn, where he now teaches in the public school system. The book is inspired by his experiences with city schools, fatherlessness and poverty.

Maldonado will share the story of how writing

New language-learning system available

Beginning in January 2013, the Atlantic City Free Public Library will offer the Pronunciator online language-learning system — and it's free for all library customers.

With 60 of the world's most popular languages, and ESL courses in 50 languages, Pronunciator is focused on quickly building conversational skills through a suite of interactive online drills, scored

quizzes, and downloadable audio lessons and phrase-books.

Pronunciator offers five possible levels of instruction for each language, covering vocabulary, verbs, simple sentences, and conversation. One level, specifically for tourists and business travelers, teaches 1,500 essential phrases covering everyday situations.

Oxford African American Studies Center is available through library website

The Oxford African American Studies Center is one of the many premium eResources offered by the Atlantic City Free Public Library.

The Oxford African American Studies Center combines the authority of carefully edited reference works with sophisticated technology to create the most comprehensive collection of scholarship available online to focus on the lives and events which have shaped African American and African history and culture.

The Oxford African American Studies Center provides students, scholars and librarians with more than 10,000 articles by top scholars in the field.

In addition to the full-text of these works, the Center draws on other key resources from Oxford's reference program, including the Concise Oxford Companion to African American Literature, the Oxford Companion to Black British History, and selected articles from other major reference titles. More than 2,500 images, more than 450 primary sources with specially written commentaries, and nearly 200 maps have been collected to enhance this reference content. More than 150 charts and tables offer information on everything from demographics to government and politics to business and labor to education and the arts.

A key feature of the Oxford African American Studies Center site is the ongoing editorial program. The site continues to grow with new and updated content added on a regular basis, including the latest biographies from the African American National Biography project and additional primary documents with commentary.

The Oxford African American Studies Center is available through the library website — www.acfpl.org. Atlantic City Library members with access to the Internet can use Oxford any time of day. Also, it is available to those visiting the library.
