Liebowitz will discuss his book "Steel Pier, Atlantic City: Showplace of the Nation." His work is the first in-depth book written solely on Steel Pier.

A large-format coffee-table book, *Steel Pier, Atlantic City: Showplace of the Nation* chronicles the history of seaside entertainment piers, Atlantic City's competing piers and the incredible rise of Steel Pier, which

has been described as "a combination of Broadway, Miami, Las Vegas, Hollywood, Barnum and Bailey, and a state fair." The book includes 227 historic photographs and images.

Liebowitz, who has researched the Steel Pier and Atlantic City's entertainment

history for years, has written articles for the *Baltimore Sun*, *Baltimore Jewish Times* and *Generations*, the journal of the Jewish Museum of Maryland. He resides outside of Baltimore.

Here are some other interesting or helpful facts about the Atlantic City Free Public Library.

- The library offers free validation of one-hour parking at the New York Avenue Parking Garage. Tip: if you visit the Main Library on the weekend, park in an unmarked spot in the nearby City Hall parking lot.
- An expanded Richmond Branch Library is being constructed and should be open within the next year.
- The Main Library is open seven days a week, and Atlantic City Library Express — a temporary location while the Richmond Branch is under construction — is open Tuesday through Saturday.
- The current best sellers list and books on the list are prominently displayed on a rack near the main entrance to the Main Library.
- Most of the library's premium e-resources are available to our members 24/7 from any device with access to the Internet.
- A free online tutoring service for children and teens is available through the library's website. Call (609) 345-2269, ext. 3050, to learn more.
- Library card holders can make an advance reservation to use a computer
- If you need Word Processing, you will be given up to two hours of computer time if you have a computer card.
- Free computer training classes are offered for library members — including classes in Spanish!
