Asian-Pacific American Heritage Month program: Tibetan Wishing Banner

Sunday, May 6, at 2 p.m.

Tibetan wish or prayer flags traditionally are used to promote peace, compassion, strength and wisdom. Tibetans do not believe that the flags carry prayers to the gods, but rather that their messages and wishes will be blown by the wind to spread goodwill and compassion into all-pervading space. In this project, students will use a liquid wax resist that will be painted onto silk rectangles. Vibrant color and a final gold embellishment finish the piece. These are painted on pieces of silk using a wax resist and fabric paint. Ages 8 through adult

The Atlantic City Free Public Library will present its Third annual Library Day at the Atlantic City Aquarium on Saturday, May 12.

A day of crafts, face painting, diving and animal shows, and storytelling is planned for Library Day at the Aquarium.

Those interested in attending can request two free admission tickets at the Main Library Youth Services Department. Library cardholders also have the option of requesting their two tickets at Atlantic City Library Express.

Free admission tickets are limited. Those who don't receive free tickets but wish to participate can pay for admission at the aquarium. Admission is \$8 for adults, \$6 for seniors and \$5 for children ages 4-12. Children under three are free. Children 12 years of age or younger must be accompanied by an adult.

The Library Day at the Aquarium schedule is:

Live Diver Feeding Show at 11 a.m. — Watch and interact with a diver in scuba gear as he or she hands feeds the stingrays and sharks inside the 25,000gallon tank.

Arts and crafts from 11:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. (or while supplies last) — The ocean has long been an inspiration for artists. Try your hand at creating an ocean-themed masterpiece with sand, shells, reeds, paint and conventional art supplies. You're only limited by your imagination!

Face painting from 12-3 p.m. — Children are invited to get a sea creature painted on their face for free.

Feeding Time at 12 and 3 p.m. — Hand feed the baby stingrays and bamboo sharks! Bags of food are \$2 (or \$1 for Aquarium members).

Exotic Animal Show at 2 p.m. — Get close to the Aquarium's more unusual inhabitants. Meet the largest species of scorpion and the softest furred mammal in the world.

May is Asian-Pacific American Heritage Month. Did you know that:

• According to the 2010 Census, U. S. residents of Asian descent now represent the fastest growing segment of the U.S population? More than five percent (17.3 million people) is of Asian descent.

• More than 15 percent of Atlantic City's population is of Asian descent. The Atlantic City Free Public Library offers a great eResource called Library Press Display. This resource offers instant online access to current newspapers from around the world, in full-page format and in their original language.

More than 1,700 newspapers from 92 countries and 48 languages are available, including publications from China, Cambodia, India, Indonesia, Japan, the Philippines, South Korea and Thailand.

Library staffers honored for their work

Atlantic City Free Public Library staff members Heather Halpin Perez and Mimi Lee were honored for their contributions to the Atlantic City community.

Perez was named one of *Atlantic City Weekly*'s Top 40 Under 40 honorees in the publication's March 15 issue.

The list consists of 40 local leaders in the area under the age of 40. All of the honorees were nominated and then selected from a committee of A.C. Weekly staff and the Greater Atlantic City Jaycees.

A.C. Weekly created this annual award in 2005. Perez, who is the archivist of the library's Alfred M. Heston Collection of Atlantic City history, is the first library staff member to receive this award.

Perez and the Top 40 Under 40 honorees were recognized at MIXX at Borgata on March 30.

La Casa Dominicana (The Dominican Home) honored Lee, the library's outreach coordinator, for her outstanding achievements, dedication to public service and contribution to the community.

La Casa Dominicana presented Lee with a certificate of appreciation at a special flag raising cermony at Police and Firemen's Memorial Plaza in honor of the 168th Dominican Republic Independence Day.
