September is Library Card **Sign-up Month** – a time when the Atlantic City Free Public Library, the American Library Association and libraries across the country remind parents that a library card is the most important school supply of all.

The observance was launched in 1987 to meet the challenge of then Secretary of Education William J. Bennett who said: "Let's have a national

campaign . . . every child should obtain a library card, and use it." Since then, thousands of public and school libraries join each fall in a national effort to ensure every child does just that.

Libraries play an important role in the education and development of children. Studies show that children who are read to in the home and who use the library perform better in school and are more likely to continue to use the library as a source of lifetime learning.

Check it out

The Atlantic City Free Public Library offers books, magazines, CDs, audio and video formats and computers. The Library also offers a variety of programs to stimulate an interest in reading and learning. Preschool story hours expose young children to the joy of reading, while the Homework Center provides computers and assistance to older children after school. The Library's Summer Reading Program keeps children reading during school vacation, helps to avoid the decrease in reading skills that educators refer to as "summer learning loss." Movies and puppet shows are other popular offerings.

English for ESL students). Rosetta Stone provides instruction and practice in the four language skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing. By matching words and phrases to pictures, users can quickly grasp meanings and usage. The Rosetta Stone's awardwinning method uses thousands of real-life images, written text and voices of native speakers.

Hispanic Heritage Month (Sept. 15-Oct. 15) In 1968, Congress authorized President Lyndon B. Johnson to proclaim a week in September as National Hispanic Heritage Week. The observance was expanded in 1988 to a month long celebration (Sept. 15-Oct. 15). During this month, America celebrates the culture and traditions of U.S. residents who trace their roots to Spain, Mexico and the Spanish-speaking nations of Central America, South America and the Caribbean. Sept. 15 was chosen as the starting point for the celebration because it is the anniversary of independence of five Latin American countries - Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. In addition, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on Sept. 16 and Sept. 18, respectively.

CELEBRATING 100 YEARS LIBRARY HISTORY FROM 1980 - 2005

The early 1980's were challenging years for the library heritage of the community. The audiovisual collection with reductions in staff and hours of operation, but Atlantic City was already on the road to recovery as a result of the approval of the Casino Gambling Referendum in 1976. In 1982 the library's budget felt the positive impact of the growth of the casino industry. By that time, farsighted library board members and staff had presented their case for the need for a new facility. and with the support of Atlantic City officials, planning was already underway. During the early portion of the decade, the library was constructed and the operation was moved to the new facility on Tennessee and Atlantic Avenues in 1985. The years that followed the move were a time of adjustment to the demand of the larger facility and growing use by the public. As the decade closed, the staff and Board of Trustees of the Library were once again actively planning the future and look confidently ahead to the 1990's.

The 90's were a decade of growth, as the library incorporated new technology and began to offer new formats to meet the diverse educational, recreational and informational needs of the community. Library resources and programs were offered which celebrated the rich cultural expanded to include videos and compact discs, and the Library successfully implemented a major automation project that increased efficiency and expanded access to the world of information. This project was called LION... Library Information Online Network, and automated the Library's catalog, as well as the circulation, acquisitions, and cataloging functions. The first public computing facilities were installed in 1995 and were expanded at the Main Library and Richmond Branch in 2003 with a grant from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. In addition to public Internet access and online databases, the Library's computer centers offered a range of software including word processing.

New technology continues to play a major role in expanding access and information for both staff and the general public. The library has been successful in meeting the challenges of a new era and the needs of the community through classes in computer technology as well as the ever expanding collection and service offerings.

Tarr, a freelance graphic artist, said she's made countless presentations on graphic design and digital photography for various

groups. So it was a natural marriage when Tarr, a SCAN — Senior Citizens Activity Network — Learning Center computer instructor, began to incorporate techniques learned through her freelance graphic design business into her photography.

The Library exhibit will include photographs of her garden along with photos taken over 14 years of baseball stadiums and baseball memorabilia collected by her partner, Fred Burg, and Tarr's photographs of stadium scoreboards.

RSS Feeds are a fairly new computer technology that will send you the latest information or breaking news about a particular subject or set of subjects that you choose. Internet sites such as the BBC are offering RSS Feeds. You can use one of the Library's RSS Feed for information including "What items do I currently have checked out and when are they due?"; "What items do I have on hold?"; "What upcoming Events are scheduled at the Library?". You need to have RSS Feed software or Internet Browsers such as Mozilla Firebird, Mozilla Thunderbird or Opera installed on your computer. RSS Feeds will not work with Microsoft Internet Explorer. 
