towns, colleges and universities, in schools and in businesses help transform their communities every day,” Atlantic City Free Public Library Director Maureen Sherr Frank said.






## Playaway writes new chapter in audio books

Beginning this April, the Atlantic City Free Public Library will offer Playaway — the first self-playing digital audio book — adding the innovative digital format to our existing audio book collection.

Half the size of a deck of cards, Playaway is the simplest way to listen to a book on the go and — with no tapes or CDs — can hold as few as two or as many as 80 hours of content on each unit. Using clearly marked buttons, Playaway gives listeners the ability to move back and forth within or



between chapters and alter the speed of a narrator’s voice. It even has an automatic bookmark feature that remembers where you left off. Additionally, Playaway has a universal headphone jack that works with almost any type of headphone or mobility accessory.

“Playaway’s simple functionality and immediate usability separate it from other audio book formats,” Library Director Maureen Sherr Frank said. “With

Playaway, our patrons can enjoy best-selling content with first-rate digital audio.”

There are more than 400 bestselling current and classic titles on Playaway, including many selections for children. And because Playaway’s format is friendly for listeners of all ages, every patron can enjoy the new format.

Share your way with words at annual poetry reading

► The library will hold two poetry writing workshops prior to its 15th annual Poetry Reading, which is slated for Saturday, April 26.

The Atlantic City Free Public Library will continue its tradition of celebrating National Poetry Month by hosting its 15th annual Poetry Reading at 2 p.m. on Saturday, April 26.

Those interested in improving or brushing up on their writing skills will have the opportunity at two workshops at the library.

Local newspaper columnist and radio host Raymond Tyler, who is also a skilled poet, will be the instructor at these workshops. The workshops will be held 2 to 3:30 p.m. on Saturday, March 22 and 29. The workshops, which are open to people of all ages, are free and no registration is required.

Those who want to participate in the library's poetry reading are re-

quired to submit their poems by Monday, March 31. Each person is invited to submit up to three poems in the order in which they will be read.

All submissions must be typed and single spaced on 8.5" x 11" paper and camera ready so it can be included in the library's 2008 Poetry Reading Chapbook. All poems must be suitable for people of all ages.

To submit your poems, mail them to: Atlantic City Free Public Library, ATT: Poetry Reading, One North Tennessee Avenue, Atlantic City, NJ 08401; or, you can drop them off at the Administrative Office, located on the second floor of the Main Library, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

National Poetry Month was established by the Academy of American Poets as a month-long, national celebration of poetry. The

concept was to increase the attention paid by individuals and the media to the art of poetry, living poets, our poetic heritage and poetry books and magazines. In the end, the goal was to achieve an increase in the visibility, presence and accessibility of poetry in our culture. National Poetry Month has grown over the years into the largest literary celebration in the world.

The goals of National Poetry Month are to:

- Highlight the extraordinary legacy and ongoing achievement of American poets.
- Introduce more Americans to the pleasures of reading poetry.
- Bring poets and poetry to the public in innovative ways.
- Make poetry a more important part of the school curriculum.
- Encourage increased publication, distribution and sales of poetry books.

The Film Society meets twice per month. The group watches a film on a Saturday and then discusses it as a group. The group also learns some of the nuances of the film that might go unnoticed by some people.

The Monday meeting is a classroom session that involves learning about some aspect of cinema.

● **Saturday, March 1, at 1 p.m.** — The Film Society will view and discuss “Chinatown.” This 1974 crime classic, starring Jack Nicholson and Faye Dunaway, is rated R and runs 131 minutes.

● **Monday, March 3, at 5:30 p.m.** — Classroom session: Screenplays, Part IV, Page-by-page analysis. This session will focus on the first 10 pages of China-town in detail. This script is considered by some to be the greatest screenplay ever.

● **Saturday, April 12, at 1 p.m.** — The group will watch and discuss “Battleship Potemkin.” This 1925 Russian masterpiece, arguably the most influential silent film ever, is not rated and runs 70 minutes.

● **Monday, April 14, at 5:30 p.m.** — Classroom session: Film restoration. Learn how classic films are restored to their original condition and given audio and visual technological updates. The restoration of “Battleship Potemkin” will be used as an example.
