towns, colleges and universities, in schools and in businesses help transform their communities every day," Atlantic City Free Public Library Director Maureen Sherr Frank said.




The library has planned a contest and food drive for this special week.

▶ All a user needs to do to listen to this digital audio book, which is the size of a half deck of cards, is put on headphones and push play.


Beginning this April, the Atlantic City Free Public Library will offer Playaway – the first self-playing digital audio book – adding the innovative digital format to our existing audio book collection.

Half the size of a deck of cards, Playaway is the simplest way to listen to a book on the go and — with no tapes or CDs — can hold as few as two or as many as 80 hours of content on each unit. Using clearly marked buttons, Playaway gives listeners the ability to move back and forth within or



between chapters and alter the speed of a narrator's voice. It even has an automatic bookmark feature that remembers where you left off. Additionally, Playaway has a universal headphone jack that works with almost any type of headphone or mobility accessory.

"Playaway's simple functionality and immediate usability separate it from other audio book formats," Library Director Maureen Sherr Frank said. "With
