## Library to hold 24th Kwanzaa show Dec. 3

The Atlantic City Free Public Library will continue a long-standing tradition by celebrating Kwanzaa with a special performance.

The Afro-One Dance, Drama and Drum Theatre, under the direction of Dr. Patricia Reid Merritt, will be the featured performer at the library's 24th annual celebration on Saturday, Dec. 3, at 2 p.m., at the All Wars Memorial Building, located at 1510 Adriatic Ave.

This free event, which is open to people of all ages, will combine song, music, poetry and traditional and contemporary dance with an educational element.

A professor of Social Work and African-American Studies at the Richard Stockton College of New Jersey, Dr. Reid-Merritt has been the recipient of numerous honors and awards, including the NAACP Freedom Award.

Afro-One was founded in 1974 and emphasizes dance, drama and music in the African-American arts. Afro-One has performed at schools,

## Computer training for job seekers offered in Nov.

The Atlantic City Free Public Library is offering four-hour computer classes in November for job seekers looking to improve their computer and job search skills. The classes will focus on the essential computer skills needed in today's job market.

These free classes, which will be held in the Main Library meeting room, are for Atlantic City Library members 18 years of age and older. Since seating is limited, advanced registration is required. To register for any of these classes, please visit the Computer Help Desk on the first floor of the Main Library, located at One North Tennessee Ave.

The training is part of a \$5.1 million National Telecommunications and Information Administration American Recovery and Reinvestment Act grant to support the New Jersey State Library's Broadband Technology Opportunity Program (BTOP). The program's goal is to make New Jersey libraries strategic job-creating facilities by adding computer workstations, upgrading Internet connectivity, and providing job search assistance and workforce development programs.

**Basic Job Readiness, MS Windows** on Wednesday, Nov. 2, from 1 to 5 p.m. – Gain a basic understanding of the PC components and operations in the Microsoft Windows environment, including proper start-up and shut-down of the Windows operating system, running application programs, managing and organizing files/folders and printing.

**Basic Job Readiness, Internet** on Wednesday, Nov. 9, from 1 to 5 p.m. – A hands-on class that will cover how to navigate the World Wide Web using the address bar and search engines. Learn how to effectively research information on the Internet and protect the computer from viruses. The content of this class will center on job searches using select websites for career opportunities and interview skills.

**Basic Job Readiness, Email** on Wednesday, Nov. 16, from 1 to 5 p.m. – Learn how to create and send an email with an attachment, how to properly forward an email and other email etiquette essentials. Setting up an address book will also be covered. At the end of this class, participants will be able to communicate with customers and colleagues quickly and easily.

## Want your child to become a reader? Get the ball rolling with Baby Bounce

Do you want your child to become a good reader at a young age, and to gain the enjoyment and confidence that comes from being able to read?

It is NEVER too early to lay that foundation and help your child develop the skills they will need when learning to read.

The Atlantic City Free Public Library has a weekly reading program for infants called Baby Bounce, which is held at 11:30 a.m. on most Thursdays in the Main Library's meeting room.

Caregivers are invited to bring their infant for stories, songs, nursery rhymes and more. Baby Bounce is best suited for infants ages 0 to 18 months. The library asks that there is one caregiver per child.

Studies have shown that language skills and intelligence are related to how many words an infant

hears each day. Reading to your baby also helps strengthen the bond between parent and child.

"The repetition of rich language, rhyme and song shared in a warm, loving environment is one of the greatest gifts a baby can receive," Atlantic City Library Children's Services Coordinator Maureen Moffit said.

## Archivist's letter about libraries' transformation appears in New York Times

Atlantic City Free Public Library reference librarian and archivist Shannon O'Neill wrote a letter that appeared on the op-art page of *The New York Times* on Sunday, Oct. 16.

O'Neill wrote about whether libraries, due to the difficult times they are currently facing, will disappear (she says libraries will persist). Here are some excerpts from her letter:

*"Libraries are always in a state of transformation: as the means of information production and consumption change, so do libraries. We exist to help you navigate complex systems of information, whether it's the bureaucracy of*

*the welfare system or a pile of dusty boxes filled with archival documents. This is an increasingly necessary service in a society that is ever more reliant upon data."*

O'Neill said one constant change has been the appearance of libraries:

*"The way the library looks today is drastically different from the way it did 50 years ago. Many of the visual cues of library-ness are vanishing. When we moved to automated and integrated library systems, we no longer had a need for iconic items like card catalogs or*

*stamps for due dates."*



The Times also included photos that O'Neill took of older library staples, such as a library due date stamp and microfilm.

*"I have chosen these items not only because I am already a little nostalgic for them, but also because I know that their passing marks an important shift in the role and functions of the library. 'Who knows? One day, the shiny new scanner that sits on my desk may join their ranks.'"*

# Did You Know?

## Sixty percent of adults in the U.S. have public library cards

Here are some interesting facts about United States libraries:

- Americans go to school, public and academic libraries nearly three times more often than they go to the movies.
- Reference librarians in the nation's public and academic libraries answer nearly 5.7 million questions weekly. Standing single file, the line of questioners would span from Long Island, New York, to Juneau, Alaska.
- A 2009 poll conducted for the American Library Association found that 96 percent respondents agreed that public libraries play an important role in giving everyone a chance to succeed because it provides free access to materials and resources.
- There are more public libraries than McDonald's in the United States — a total of 16,604, including branches.
- Americans spend more than twice as much on candy as they do on public libraries.
- Americans check out an average of more than seven books a year.
- Public libraries are the number one point of online access for people without Internet connections at home, school or work.
- 98.7 percent of public libraries provide public access to the Internet.
- More than 65 percent of public libraries provide services for job seekers.
