Library marks 'Empire' return with '20s programs

Free Boardwalk concert, updated exhibits with rare Nucky Johnson childhood photos among highlights

The Atlantic City Free Public Library is celebrating the season two premiere of HBO's Boardwalk Empire by "Roaring Back to the '20s" – a special program series and exhibit highlighting this golden era in Atlantic City history.

The celebration includes a free concert on the boardwalk showcasing the era's music and dance, a panel discussion featuring Nelson Johnson – the historian whose book inspired the smash hit series – and library exhibits that include rarely seen childhood photographs of Enoch "Nucky" Johnson.

All of the programs are free and open to the public. No registration is required.

• **Book Talk with Author Jim Waltzer on Saturday, Sept. 3, at 2 p.m. at the Main Library (One North Tennessee Ave.)** – Waltzer will discuss his novel, "Brother's Keeper," which takes

place in Atlantic City in the 1920s. It is a story that explores ambition, high-level crime and racial conflict in a place where people and jobs came and went like the tides.

• **The Music and Dance of the Roaring 20s on Saturday, Sept. 24, at 1 p.m., at Kennedy Plaza (Atlantic City Boardwalk between Mississippi**

and Georgia avenues) – The Jersey Rhythm Devils and Jim Craine Band will play the music of this era. Between the one-hour musical sets, Melanie Brough will put on a flapper dancing demonstration and teach the audience the dance moves. The Jersey Rhythm Devils perform a diverse array of music, from the popular tunes of the '20s, to early blues,

as well as some of the more obscure, but genuinely fun material of the time period. Craine, long known throughout the area as "The Singing Lifeguard," has performed in many of the casinos in his native Atlantic City and throughout the East Coast and Canada. He has also opened

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Film Society's fifth anniversary includes guest

The Atlantic City Free Public Library Film Society celebrated its fifth anniversary in July with the help of a special guest.

Elizabeth Taylor – who his father represented, his acting career and work as a publicist. His resume includes representing/advising clients and working on an extensive list of projects in theatre, film and television.

"It was an honor to have Gary speak to our group," Film Society coordinator Theresa Hawkins said. "We have been friends for many years, so he felt free to provide us

with unforgettable tales about his relationships with some of the greatest stars of all time. Some of the Film Society members said it was the best library presentation they had ever attended."

The Film Society meets twice every month. The first meeting of the month is to watch a movie and discuss it. The second meeting is a classroom

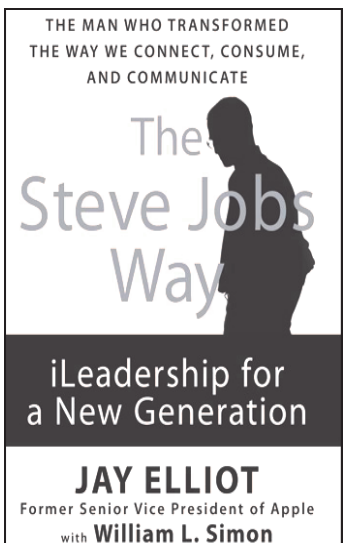

MP3 audiobooks now available

The Atlantic City Free Public Library now offers MP3 CD audiobooks. There are approximately 115 titles – featuring non-fiction, fiction and language learning tool CDs – in the collection.

What makes an MP3 CD different than a regular CD? A regular audio CD holds roughly 80 minutes of content, while an MP3 CD can hold much more – even an entire audiobook! That added capacity prevents listeners from being forced to change CDs while enjoying their audiobook.

Those interested in listening to an MP3 audiobook must have an MP3 compatible device. Those who don't have an MP3 compatible CD

player can burn the MP3 audiobook on to their computer and listen to it there. Also, MP3 audiobooks can be downloaded to an MP3 player, such as an iPod.

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Teens making impact

TAG volunteers help resumes while helping library

The Atlantic City Free Public Library and its Teen Advisory Group (TAG) have forged a relationship that has been mutually beneficial.

The TAG group, which consists of volunteers ages 13-17, helps with a variety of library tasks: from shelving books and assisting the younger children with craft projects to web design and working at library and community programs.

“Our current group of volunteers is truly amazing,” Teen Services Librarian Laura Hunt said. “They are motivated, smart, and creative. They care about the community and want TAG to be involved in making not only the library a better place, but all of Atlantic City. They are willing to help with tasks large and small.”

While the teens’ presence at and contributions to the library are evident, their volunteer work also helps them personally.

As the teens are carrying out their tasks, they are compiling volunteer hours that will enhance job and college applications. Hunt said the teens can also track their hours in pursuit of a Presidential Volunteer Service Award. They are also asked for their opinions about the services, programs and materials that they want and need provided at the library.

Hunt said the teens have tackled some bigger projects that utilize their strengths. Some of their ongoing or recent projects include:

- Developing a library app
- Starting an origami club and a film club that taped a book trailer for “The Hunger Games” by Suzanne Collins
- Creating a flickr page for an online teen gallery
- Choosing a template for a new library

- Writing reviews for the library’s teen blog, “Teen Rants and Raves”

“TAG can be an outlet for their creativity,” Hunt said. “Many of the projects TAG members work on require planning, problem solving, and artistic ability. And through it all they are able to make friends and have fun.”

The library is looking for teenagers who can volunteer throughout the school year to

join TAG.

The group holds monthly meetings at the Main Library during the school year. The next meetings are 2 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 10, and Saturday, Oct. 8.
